The Lycoming County SPCA responded to the needs of our community by traveling to several locations throughout the county to pick up pets of families that were forced to evacuate their homes and could not take their pets with them to the relief shelters. The SPCA also accepted several other pets that were delivered to the SPCA for temporary shelter during the disaster.

At no cost to the families affected, all of these displaced pets were housed and cared for at the SPCA until their families were able to safely return home.

The SPCA was also responsible for the care of numerous pets that were found as strays due to the hurricanes and worked hard to identify their owners and reunite them with their families.



The SPCA also held donation drives to obtain much needed pet supplies that were donated to area disaster relief centers and were eventually distributed to families in need throughout our service area.

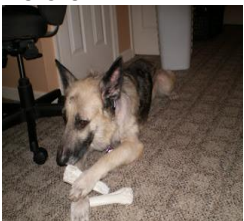

In 2011, the SPCA investigated and prosecuted several cases of dog shootings in our service area. In one case, a white German Shepherd was shot and found floating in the river near Jersey Shore, PA. This beautiful dog was later identified as "Skippy." After several months of investigations, Skippy and her owners received justice as the person responsible was identified and eventually pled guilty to the heinous act.
